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What is Work-Based Learning?


Work-Based Learning Programs (WBL) are structured educational experiences that integrate classroom learning (school based) with productive, structured work experiences (work based), related to a student's career goals. This will increase their knowledge, skills, and abilities, for obtaining employment and/or post-secondary education.

Key Components

- school-based learning
- work-based learning
- connecting activities

Work-Based Learning:

- provides paid or unpaid work experience
- promotes a partnership between education and industry
- integrates academic and technical instruction



How does Work-Based Learning work?

Work-Based Learning provides an opportunity for Juniors and Seniors to start preparing for a career while still in high school. Individual programs of study in the freshman and sophomore years prepare students for a successful Work-Based Learning experience.

Work-Based Learning Categories

- **ESD**-Placement that may/may not be linked to a student's career path; Work activities have an indirect relationship to previous or current classroom studies
- **Cooperative Education**-A combination of technical and academic course work and worksite experiences. Students earn credit and pay working in jobs secured through training agreements and plans
- **Internship/Practicum**- A short/long-term, paid/non-paid placement that is directly related to a student's program of study
- **Youth Apprenticeship**- Curriculum linking secondary and post-secondary education. Qualified students accumulate a set number of on-the-job training hours beyond high school

How will Work-Based Learning benefit student?

Work-Based Learning offers student's academic and work-site learning opportunities that are related to the student's career interest area.

- Earn high school credit towards graduation while gaining work experience
- Increase career option and future employability
- Earn GA Work Ready and Georgia B.E.S.T Certifications
- Experience the connection between education and real-life work skills
- Develop professionalism through responsibility, positive attitudes and work ethics
- Establish a career choice before entering post-secondary education

College Prep Checklist

Junior Year

Your junior year is the time to fine tune your classes and grades. Sharpen your test taking skills. Narrow down your college and career choices. By staying on top of things this year, you'll find your senior year could be a little less stressful.

Students

- Meet with your guidance counselor to make sure you are on track to graduate and meet all necessary requirements for graduation, academic rigor and college admissions.
- Continue to explore career options, how much education you'll need and the earning potential.
- Continue to research colleges and what you should look for to make sure you find a good fit. As you look at potential schools, visit their websites and find their net price calculators. These tools can help determine the true cost of attending that specific college.
- Go to a PROBE College Fair. If your school has a financial aid night, be sure to attend.
- Take the PSAT/NMSQT to qualify for scholarships and programs associated with the National Merit Scholarship Program.
- Register for and take exams like the SAT, SAT Subject Test, and the ACT for college admission. Check for free test prep classes in your area.
- Start drafting essays to use for scholarships and college admissions applications.
- Search for scholarships you may be eligible for to help pay for college on **GAfutures**, as well as through your guidance counselor, community, family and friends.
- Schedule campus visits or contact colleges you are interested in attending to request information about financial aid, admission requirements, applications and deadlines.

- Attend events like PROBE College Fairs and visit college campuses. Let your child do most of the talking.
- Review your financial situation and make sure you're planning for the cost of college appropriately.
- Make sure your child is searching for local and national scholarships. Ask your employer whether any scholarships are available for the children of employees.

Automobile Maintenance & Light Repair

Career Cluster: Transportation, Distribution & Logistics

Students in this pathway will learn the basic skills needed to gain employment as a maintenance and light repair technician. Students will be exposed to courses in automotive preventative maintenance and servicing and replacing brakes, and steering and suspension components. In addition, student will learn how to do general electrical system diagnosis, learn electrical theory, perform basic tests and determine necessary action. The hours completed in this pathway are aligned with ASE (Auto Service Excellence)/NATEF (National Automotive Technicians Education Foundation) standards and are a base for the entry-level technician. CTSO: SkillsUSA
Certifications: Auto Service Excellence (ASE)-MLR, Valvoline Undercar, Schaeffer Clutch, NAPA Car Care, SP2 Safety

Computer Programming

Career Cluster: Information Technology

This pathway is designed for high school students to strategize, design, and develop games and mobile and desktop applications that can be produced in the real world. Students will learn about life-cycles of project development and use models to develop applications. Attention will be placed on how user interfaces affect the usability and effectiveness of a game or an application. Various forms of technologies will be used to expose students to resources, software, and applications of programming. Employability skills are integrated into activities, tasks, and projects throughout the course standards to demonstrate the skills required by business and industry. CTSO: FBLA, SkillsUSA

Certifications: Java Certified Associate, Microsoft Technology Associate (MTA)

Computer Information Systems and Support

Career Cluster: Information Technology

Students in this pathway develop the skills necessary for supporting and servicing computers. Topics include component identification, memory-system, peripheral installation and configuration, preventive maintenance, hardware diagnostics -repair, installation and optimization of system software, Windows Operating system configuration, and device-drivers. Upon completion, students should be able to select appropriate computer equipment and software, upgrade and maintain existing equipment and software, and troubleshoot then repair non-functioning computers and printers. This course prepares students for the Comptia A+ Certification. CTSO: SkillsUSA

Certifications: Comptia A+, Microsoft Office Specialist (MOS)

Construction (Carpentry, Electrical, Masonry, Plumbing)

Career Cluster: Architecture & Construction

This pathway is designed to prepare students for pursuit of Carpentry, Electrical, Masonry, and Plumbing careers in construction. Students will explore how the various crafts have influenced and been influenced by history. This pathway also provides basic skills and knowledge needed to apply Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) safety concepts and practices relating to the specified trades. The student will also learn and apply knowledge of the care and safe use of hand and power tools as related to each trade. In addition, students will be introduced to and develop skills to differentiate between blueprints related to each individual craft area. CTSO: SkillsUSA

Certifications: SkillsUSA Workforce Ready System, National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER), Work Ready Assessment

Cosmetology

Career Cluster: Human Services

This pathway introduces students to the cosmetology profession. Students will learn the various methods of disinfection, sanitation, and safety used in the cosmetology industry. This pathway introduces various types of scalp treatments, hair and scalp structures, and hair disorders. Students also learn the laws, rules, regulations and how they govern the cosmetology industry. There is emphasis on the importance of salon management and the knowledge and skills necessary to build a successful business. *CTSO: SkillsUSA*
Certifications: Up to 450 Licensure Hours upon successful completion of pathway (1500 Hours required for Georgia licensure)

Dental Science

Career Cluster: Health Science

This pathway is designed for students wishing to pursue a career in the area of Dental Science. Students will receive initial exposure to dental health science technical skills and attitudes applicable to dental health occupations. Students are required to meet both national and intrastate professional guidelines as designated by applicable regulatory agencies such as the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), Center for Disease Control (CDC) and the Georgia Board of Dentistry. *CTSO: HOSA*
Certifications: Dental Assisting Assessment, NOCTI Job Ready Assessment

Law Enforcement Services/Criminal Investigations/Forensic Science

Career Cluster: Law, Public Safety, Corrections and Security

This pathway includes, but is not limited to, introduction to the criminal justice system, police ethics and constitutional law, patrol procedures, traffic control procedures, defensive tactics and physical proficiency skills, interpersonal and communication skills, investigation procedures, court systems and trial procedures, correctional system, introduction to forensic science, crime prevention, property control, and employability skills. *CTSO: SkillsUSA*
Certifications: CPR, CERT (Community Emergency Response Training)

Manufacturing

Career Cluster: Manufacturing

This pathway provides students with an introduction to manufacturing technology and its relationship with society, individuals, and the environment. This pathway also includes a study of the various managed activities which are used to develop, produce, use, and assess production technology. Research and development, production, and marketing techniques are reviewed. In addition, students learn about a wide variety of production techniques. Fabrication and assembly steps are highlighted. Assuring product quality is also explored. *CTSO: Technology Student Association*
Certifications: Automated Manufacturing Technology Skills Connect Assessment (AMT), NOCTI Job Ready Assessment, Auto Desk

Healthcare-Nursing/Allied Health

Career Cluster: Health Science

Students wishing to pursue a career in the Healthcare Industry will receive initial exposure to healthcare science skills and attitudes applicable to healthcare including the concepts of health, wellness, and preventive care. *CTSO: HOSA*
Certifications: Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA), Certified Clinical Medical Assistant (CCMA), Medical Office Assistant (MOA)

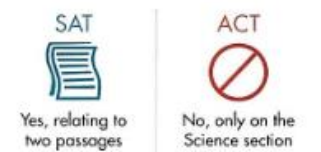
